Ice arena supporters break ground on expansion

A \$750,000 expansion project is underway this spring at the Blue Mound Ice Arena in Luverne.

Fundraising began "in house" with hockey and figure skating families making their pledges.

Donations are also sought from alumni, private individuals and corporations. The Luverne Hockey Association is a 501(c)3 organization, so donations are tax deductible.

Interior improvement plans include a two-story 112-by-32-foot addition that will be connected to the north side of the existing rink. The concession stand will be expanded to meet code and to provide more serving space for food items and more seating for diners.

When he arrived at her door to pick her up, all Rita could think about was: "I am going to prom with the red lobster; this will surely impress my classmates."

A hockey dryland training room will allow for off-ice workouts for stick handling, plyometrics and cardiovascular work. Two handicap-accessible restrooms will be constructed off the lobby.

The expanded lobby will create better travel into and out of the building and an upper mezzanine area will be available for community gathering or as a workout area for athletes.

The expansion plan also includes additional locker rooms that will allow boys' and girls' varsity teams to leave gear at the facility.

Exterior plans include improving the outdoor ice with a more solid, clay-type material to be put down as a base. The drainage flow from the building will also be redirected and the new outdoor rink will be regulation size with newer boards.

Expansion committee members said an overall goal is for the new addition to bring some of the current problem spots up to code.

They also said they hope visitors will have a hospitable experience when they come through the door in an enjoyable environment that is comfortable and makes them want to come back.

The ice arena is used by 90 figure skaters and their families, 150 hockey players and their families and by community members enjoying open skating.

Visiting teams, physical education classes from area schools and other groups and organizations use the facility, as does a community adult open hockey league and a community adult town team.

The arena also hosts hockey



clinics and figure skating lessons.

Use of the outdoor ice is free and open to the public.

The project is scheduled to be completed by Fall 2012 in time for the fall skating season that begins in September and goes until mid-June.

Arena supporters have been fundraising for the project for several years, garnering thousands of dollars from hockey and figure skating families within the programs.

The City of Luverne has agreed to loan \$750,000 to get construction costs paid until fundraising dollars come in. That loan was approved at 1 percent interest for 30 years, although the group has indicated it will be paid well ahead of that time frame.

In addition, the city will grant \$20,000 per year for the next five

years to support ice arena operations.

Mayor Pat Baustian voiced his support for the facility, saying that it's important the city lend financial help to a project that fits so well within the community's interest.

In the past several months, fundraising efforts for the arena project have expanded to the community and corporations for donations.

Sanford Luverne is among the donors recognized during the April 10 groundbreaking.

Luverne alumni - particularly hockey and figure skating alumni - will also be contacted in the coming weeks.

the development of new and creative energy sources in the county.

Leonard Hansen (LHS 1945) and Irene (Lapic) Hansen (LHS 1945) send greetings from their home in St. Peter, MN. Len wanted to correct the information about the 1945 Regional Track Champions from the last issue. John Reimer was injured running the high hurdles during the competition. The 880 relay was to decide the championship. Len was put in John's place and along with Eddie, Alan and Howard ... who won the Regional Championship. John healed from his injuries in time for the two of them to play football for Augustana College.

Ken Vos (LHS 1948) of Sheffield, VT., completed the first draft of his memoirs which he has titled: Up The Hayloft Ladder. Publishing this book for his family and friends remembering significant events of his life, he wrote to share a story of the 1946 basketball season. Although a little late for the Tid-Bit column about basketball, the story is worth sharing:

"Pipestone was our greatest rival in those years. While the necessity of farm chores kept most of us farm boys from participating in sports, we were eager spectators at evening games. I drove our family car to the game at Pipestone, accompanied by my friends and classmate, James (Jim) Welch. As Luverne pulled ahead near the end of the game, there arose some taunting and heckling between Jim and a group of Pipestone fans. When one of them challenged Jim to a fight after the game, I was astounded when he agreed. We poured out of the gym and drove to an open area about two blocks from the school.

About fifty Pipestone partisans formed a circle in the half-light. Jim's challenger was a young man whose name was McGurdy. (We learned later that he was a regular participant in the Golden Gloves Tournaments at Slayton.) McGurdy was slightly older than Jim, and in boxing terminology was a welterweight (135 lb

class), while Jim was a lightweight (127 lb.) with no formal boxing experience.

As I surveyed the circle eager to witness a fight and saw not a single familiar face, I was seized by a feeling of panic for Jim's safety, and ran back to the school to call the police. When I arrived back at the outdoor arena about ten minutes later, the lights of a police car were blinking, the crowd was dispersing and the two antagonists were shaking hands.

I deeply admired Jim's courage and resolve. As we drove back to Luverne on highway 75, Jim kept fingering the broken tooth and complained that McGurdy had not removed the rings from his fingers.

Two conclusions can be drawn from this post-game fistfight. First, it is a cautionary tale which warns that the loyalties and intense feelings generated by sports must not be allowed to spill over into violence. Such conflicts do not always end so amicably.

Second, it was a window into Jim's personality and mine. Jim was not a troublemaker by nature, but was fearless when provoked. In our senior year, we were both accepted into the South Dakota School of Mines and Engineering. However, I changed course and attended Central College in Iowa. Jim wrote to me when we were college freshmen, and told me that he had taken up Golden Gloves boxing at his school with fair success. While I missed our 20th Luverne High class reunion in 1968, I learned afterward that he had become a very successful pharmacist, and was recognized at the reunion for having more children than anyone else in the class.

Because I had been the object of some mean bullying in both elementary and high school, Jim inspired me to seek confidence in self-defense by engaging in some Golden Gloves matches as well. Boxing, like professional football, has come into question because of its potential harm to the body. When I eventually became a Professor of Philosophy and was on sabbatical at Stanford University where I joined an aikido dojo, I learned that the martial arts are a much better alternative."



Herreid Military Museum to expand. Committee seeks help from LHS alumni

Terrie Gulden, chair of the Herreid Military Museum, announces plans for an expansion.

In cooperation with the Rock County Historical Society, plans are being developed to expand the Herreid Military Museum to the third floor of the Rock County Veterans Memorial Building.

The exhibit on the third floor, now called the Heritage Gallery, will be relocated to a site designated by the RCHS.

Freeing up this space allows for expansion and the ability to focus on additional periods of military service.

Areas of display expansion include the focus on Civil War, Korea, Vietnam, Gulf War, Desert Storm, Iraqi Freedom, War on Terror and other stories of military service.

Presently, the second floor is dedicated to the stories of service personnel from WWI and WWII.

The expansion to the third floor will allow the development of interactive kiosks, hands-on displays and life-size exhibits to tell the stories of


the brave men and women from Rock County who risked everything to serve this country.

The space will be refurbished to include locked and secure cabinetry to provide a place to exhibit precious military hardware. Gulden has plans for a 3-D gun display, bunker installation, life-size uniformed mannequins and a full scale Jeep Willy (WWII, Korea or Vietnam era.)



Community mourns loss of longtime Luverne Public Schools teacher and mayor

Luverne lost a long-time local leader and beloved schoolteacher in March when Gordy Gits died at the age of 80.

Gits was most widely known as the energetic high school English teacher who was quick to correct his students' grammar.

He taught in the Luverne School District for 34 years, from 1955 to 1989. He was 58 when he retired, and he shared thoughts on his career in a June 29, 1989, Star Herald story.

"It makes me feel like a million bucks when I actually see a kid learn," Gits said. "That's the reward of being a teacher."

This passion in the classroom was felt both ways, according to his students who shared memories on the Hartquist website.

Several said they remembered reading "A Tale of Two Cities" under Gits. Particularly the opening line, "It was the best of times and it was the worst of times," held meaning for them.

"Our life was all ahead of us, and other than vocabulary tests to dampen a festive Friday mood in English class, Mr. Gits was the epitome of a true mentor," Bruce Kurtz wrote on the Hartquist site.

"We had dreams, and he did his best to help us find the guidelines to make our youth 'the best of times.'"

He offered sympathy to the Gits family, and added, "Thousands more unseen members of your LHS family share in your loss. He taught, we learned. Today is the 'worst of times.'"

Gits started in the district

early enough to see the "new" high school under construction in 1955-56.

"In the evening some of us would go up to look at that new building rising out of the cornfield on the west edge of town," Gits said in that same 1989 Star Herald story.

"There are some footprints in the cement somewhere in that building. Sometimes we would step where we weren't supposed to."

Gits was already two years into his first term as Luverne mayor by the time he retired from the classroom.

He served three terms as mayor, from 1987 through 1992, following 12 years on the City Council, from 1968 through 1979.

In June 1992 the Star Herald featured a story about Gits not seeking another term as mayor.

Gits' said his primary goal as mayor was to get Luverne moving again. He said he felt Luverne had stagnated and was sitting still.

At that time he saw empty storefronts, dilapidated buildings and slow growth in the industrial park and believed he could help make improvements. He said small details like rotting window frames in City Hall were symptoms, to him, of an unwillingness to do things.

Luverne's major achievements during the Gits years as mayor include the Minnesota Veterans Home locating here and the establishment of the industrial park.

During that same time, the hospital expanded and the city purchased the building for Berkley Information Services.

He described successful local leadership as "aggressive."

"Too many cities wait for things to happen," he said in 1992. "They buy 40 acres and wait for businesses to come. You can't do

that and be successful."

Asked why he served the city for 18 years as an alderman and mayor, he said, "A lot of reasons, not the least of which is ego."

He said he enjoyed being involved.

"I don't want to sound corny or trite, but this community has been good to me. I had a good job for 34 years. I've got a nice home, a wonderful wife and family and a good place to retire in," Gits said.

"I think you can't just take. You have to be a part of things."

Gits continued participating in his community well into his retirement years.

Among many other volunteer projects, he played an integral role in launching the Alumni News, a quarterly newsletter for Luverne High

School alumni.

Gregg Gropel, who founded the Alumni News, reflected on Gits' contributions this week.

"Without Gordon, I don't think the paper would have happened," Gropel said.

"I knew he had experience with newspapers and, of course, I considered him an expert with grammar. He was the strength I used to build the popular paper in keeping LHS graduates connected to both the school and community. I do not consider myself an expert writer by any means, but I personally learned a lot about story writing from Gordy. ... He will be missed."

Gits and his wife, Barbara, had five children, Theresa, Paul, Stephen, Mary and Elizabeth.
