Big changes on horizon for 1950s-era school building

Luverne Public Schools

Superintendent Craig Oftedahl shared the following information with the Star Herald for print in its Sept. 21 edition.

The Board of Education at ISD 2184 is exploring the possibility of upgrading and improving the buildings on the existing campus.

A long-range facilities plan is the result of working with an independent educational facilities consulting firm. They helped district officials to examine the current buildings and blend the improvement suggestions from local staff, student and community interviews with state education requirements.

The result is a series of reports now available on the district website www.isd2184.net. Also available is the power point presentation from the public meetings.

The elementary school is already 20 years old and the cost of its construction will be paid in full this



upcoming school year.

The middle school/high school facility opened its doors in 1956.

Both buildings are currently in good shape and have been maintained extremely well.

However, continued safety and health upgrades are necessary for the 60-year-old middle/high school building to meet the standards outlined by the Minnesota Department of Education and other agencies.

This work is estimated at \$8 million to complete.

With the passage of the Ag2School legislation in St. Paul this spring, this \$8 million would result in a tax neutral impact to property owners within the district.

On average, the school district receives \$296 annually on a home with an estimated market value of \$100,000.

This amount is the lowest in the area when compared

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
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

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to neighboring school districts. The state average is \$366 for a home of the same value.

For our agricultural community, the \$8 million levy would decrease current taxes by an estimated \$2.4 million due to the new tax relief legislation.

For instance a \$10,000 acre of non-homesteaded land would decrease by \$2.37.

The long-range plan also makes educational improvements to both buildings.

Under the proposed long-range plan, the new construction, remodel, and refreshed portions of the two buildings would have a \$16 million price tag.

Here are some highlights of what would be done:

- The middle/high school kitchen and cafeteria will be moved

to the main floor and create an open commons area.

This new construction would be located between the current elementary and middle/high school buildings.

- The media center would also be relocated from its current second-floor location near the new commons.

- The music department would see a dramatic improvement in space.

The new fine arts space would be located near the new kitchen/commons areas and would have small practice room areas, more storage for equipment and uniforms, and larger classrooms to seat the greater number of students involved in the choir and band programs.

- Classroom space would be brought up to Minnesota Department of Education guidelines and have more collaborative spaces for individualized

and interdisciplinary learning.

- Special education space will be added and the entire building will be modernized with new lockers, wall coverings, furniture and technology.

- Community Education will be expanded to handle the growing trend of early childhood education.

- The District Office will be relocated as will the high school office area.

- Additional classrooms will be added to the elementary school to accommodate larger classes and greater special education needs.

The \$16 million in proposed improvements will increase property taxes if voters pass the referendum this fall.

On a \$100,000 valued home, the school levy would increase \$43 and a \$10,000 acre of non-homesteaded land would increase \$2.08. The ag community would receive a tax relief of \$4.8 million if the project was approved this fall.

During the community feedback sessions in February, there was significant interest in a new

performing arts center.

The proposed new facility would be located near the fine arts space and would add an additional \$7 million to the project.

The performing arts center could be a real asset to the district and community as a great gathering place for various functions.

The tax impact of the performing arts center is an additional \$25 annually on a home valued at \$100,000.

A \$10,000 acre of non-homesteaded land would increase \$2.08. Tax credit would be \$2.1 million on ag land.

Because the district has maintained the facilities, the upgrades and renovations being considered are less costly than constructing a new building.

With the current square footage, the replacement cost would likely be between \$90 and \$100 million if the district had to replace the entire campus.

The idea behind the long-range facilities plan is to continue the excellent education and educational facility for the next half century.

Community consultant Roger Brooks gives Luverne a guidebook for our future

Internationally known community development and destination planning consultant **ROGER BROOKS** *secret shopped* Luverne on June 5-9, 2017.

On June 9, to a crowd of over 200 people, Roger presented his analysis of where we are as a community and offered insight as to how we could move forward. People who attended the presentation came away energized with the notion of how Luverne can become even better than before.

Sponsored through grants from the Blandin Foundation, Southwest Initiative Foundation and the Luverne EDA - Luverne Initiatives for Tomorrow (LIFT) Executive Board coordinated Roger's visit. In early September, the Executive Board received his final, written comprehensive report.

Three of the major concepts that Roger proposed were to develop Luverne as the **nutcracker capital of North America**, to construct & program a plaza in downtown Luverne, and to address **wayfinding**.

The LIFT Executive Board didn't wait for the final report to energize the enthusiasm of the public to move forward. Nutcracker, Plaza and Wayfinding Committees have been formed and they have begun to move forward with enthusiasm!

In his report, Roger Brooks presented compelling evidence about the demise of malls and the development of the "European" standard of community plazas.

Not only do plazas strongly support local small retailers, they also support and build a sense of place for citizens and visitors.

In their meetings, the Plaza Committee has focused their work on discussing possible locations, learning about best practices of plaza operation and investigating what elements should be included in the development plan.

This citizen committee recently hosted a WINE WALK Fundraiser (October 7) in downtown Luverne to start raising funds for plaza development. They are also looking into the opportunity to work with the Southwest Regional Sustainable Development Partnership (part of the University of Minnesota Extension) to develop a master plan and process.

The committee is scheduled to make a presentation to the Luverne City Council in November where they hope to make a recommendation as to the planning process and share some thoughts on how we can utilize what we currently have to offer residents and visitors a "plaza experience."

Cox and Travis Dunn. Jane Lanphere staffs the committee.

Under the leadership of Luverne EDA Director Holly Sammons, a plan to move forward on addressing signage and wayfinding is underway. The City of Luverne is currently looking at the opportunity to work with a wayfinding specialty firm, recommended by Roger Brooks, to help design signage for Luverne. Their expertise and experience will offer a comprehensive blueprint as to the where, why, when and how signs are placed both now and in the future. Sammons will be working with an appointed committee through this process.

In June, when Roger Brooks visited Luverne, he stopped by the Rock County Historical Society’s new History Center. He was “blown away” when he saw Betty Mann’s donation of 2,800 nutcrackers and was even more impressed when he had the opportunity to visit with Betty. A few days later, in his formal presentation, he said that Betty’s nutcracker collection is worth getting off the Interstate to see and making Luverne the “Nutcracker Capital of North America” is something we can accomplish. With the formation of the Nutcracker Committee came a lot of great ideas and energy. Currently planned and underway are some exciting initiatives.

- Introducing a live nutcracker mascot to Luverne by November 2017
- Expanding Luverne’s Nutcracker Scavenger Hunt to more days with more nutcrackers; contest runs this year from November 10th through January 1st
- “Where’s Philo?” – a 4 foot tall nutcracker will make his debut in Luverne on Black Friday; he will show up in different businesses every 2-3 days; public invited to take a selfie with him and post it on the “Where’s Philo?” FACEBOOK page; #wheresphilo?

- Opening a nutcracker lane around the Luverne City Park with 23 nutcrackers on display with Christmas music; open Friday-Sunday from noon until 9 pm starting December 1st through December 31st plus Christmas Day and New Year Day

The Committee made a presentation to the City of Luverne’s Committee on the Whole on October 17. Included in their presentation are a couple of big ideas including the idea of nutcracker statues made out of fiberglass having them annually painted by local and visiting artists.

The biggest idea was introduced to the Committee by Tony Schomacker (LHS alumni). Tony suggested that we think big...so big as to have the world’s biggest nutcracker for our tourist attraction. Can you imagine the number of people who would stop off and spend time in Luverne when visit the nutcracker museum and having their picture taken by the world’s tallest (70-80 feet) nutcracker? Serving on the Nutcracker Committee is: Becky Rahm, Betty Mann, Cheryl Nath, Gary and Janine Papik, Roni Feit, Ryan Wynia, Tony and Lindsey Schomacker, and Sue Sandbulte. Jane Lanphere staffs the committee.

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Luverne Dollars for Scholars Did you know?

Applicants for a Luverne Dollars for Scholars award are evaluated on the following criteria: academic performance, scholastic aptitude, work experience, school activity and community involvement.

Students are also required to write an essay describing their future aspirations as well as seek a recommendation from someone, whether a teacher or an adult who has worked with the student.

These applications are due each year around February 15th. All applications are submitted through an online student profile application located on the Luverne Dollars for Scholars website.

Once all of the information is compiled, the selection process begins. Each application is assigned a number. The Luverne High School counselor verifies each students' class rank, GPA and ACT scores.

Only the application number, not the applicant name, is seen throughout the rest of the scoring.

Each essay is read and scored by a group of DFS board members. References, work experience, school activity and community involvement are cross checked against the computerized score assigned each applicant.

Not all applicants receive a scholarship. Applications who do not reach the minimum score do not qualify for a scholarship award. None of the scholarships are based on financial need.

The total amount of scholarships paid out each year varies. The DFS Board uses 4.5 percent of the five-year fair market value of its fund assets as a guide when determining the total to be awarded each year.

Students who receive a scholarship award of \$4,000 or less can use it all in one year, while scholarships greater than \$4,000 are divided out over multiple years, with \$4,000 being the max that can be paid out each year.

Scholarship funds are not paid

out until after the first semester of college has been completed. In order to receive their scholarship funds, students must maintain a minimum 2.0 GPA. Scholarship checks are paid directly to the school.

Luverne Dollars for Scholars wrapped up its 2017 awards season this past May.

Seventy-nine qualifying Luverne High School students from the Class of 2017 were awarded \$387,750. These scholarships ranged from \$1,000 to \$9,500.

By late spring or early summer of 2018, Luverne will have the second phase of the Luverne LOOP completed. For the last five years, the City of Luverne has been working to develop and complete a biking/hiking/walking trail around the City. The first phase, completed in the fall of 2016, went from Veterans Pond to Dodge Street. The second phase, from Dodge Street along the western side of Luverne to Highway 75 is to be completed by next spring. The third phase plan is in development.

When the Luverne LOOP is completed and blended with the complimentary Blue Mound Trail, Luverne will have over 13 miles of trail for walkers and non-motorized transportation. The work that has been done is to provide greater opportunity for the public, residents and visitors alike, to get and stay healthy!

Through an opportunity offered by the State Health Improvement Program (SHIP), Chamber



intern KNUTE OLDRE applied for grant funds in the summer of 2016 which were ultimately denied. In August of this year, Knute (LHS 2017 graduate) received notification that funds were now available so the LUVERNE BIKE LOAN PROGRAM is now becoming a reality.

In the spring of 2018, the LUVERNE BIKE LOAN PROGRAM will have 12 universal coaster bikes (8/adult and 4/child) that will be available for loan to any resident or visitor in Luverne. The bikes will be available for loan from the GrandStay Hotel & Suites 24/7. The loan program will require the borrower to sign a waiver and leave a credit card or driver's license for the period of the loan. The loan period is up to 24 hours but may be extended. Ken Petersen or Ken's Bike Shop of Luverne will supply the universal coaster bikes and will provide all service and maintenance.


