

Fame is to "honor former students and graduates who distinguished themselves and contributed to the vision of District 2184: Learn, Live, Lead."

Qualifications for selection to the Alumni Hall of Fame include the following at a local, regional, state, national, or international level:

- •Excellence in their profession.
- •Exceptional service, volunteerism or contributions to community.
- •Excellence in personal endeavors.
- •Exceptional contributions to education.

Five new members of the Alumni Hall of Fame were chosen for 2024.

Thomas Getman, Class of 1959, for his work on humanitarian causes.

Thomas Getman has a master's degree in theology and served from 1963 to 1976 as Young Life director in Philadelphia and New England where he guided city and education officials in desegregating Boston schools.

As a Congressional legislative director, Getman worked in African foreign policy and helped draft the Anti-Apartheid Act of 1985 after participating in legal sanctions against Rhodesia and Uganda.

Getman helped negotiate protocols with the presidents of Uganda and Zambia and guided warring African factions in their peace negotiations. He also was an adjunct speechwriter for regional and national political figures, including President Gerald R. Ford.

Getman served for 12 years as director of government relations and special assistant to the president of World Vision United States and later founded World Vision's office in Washington, D.C.


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He interpreted U.S. government policy, pressed for needed foreign assistance, and advanced human rights, relief and development concerns with Congress and the White House.

From 1997 through 2001, Getman directed World Vision's programs in Jerusalem, the West Bank and the Gaza Strip where he worked with Palestine, Israel and Jordan to and advocate for peace and justice.

As World Vision's director for international relations, he managed liaison activities with the UN and the World Council of Churches.

Today he is president of a private consulting group for international, United Nations and non-governmental affairs working on UN Reform and humanitarian interagency partnership building.

Marvin (Whitey) Helling, Class of 1941, for statewide leadership in high school sports

At Macalester College Helling was co-captain of the 1947 MIAC Champion Football Team, an All-MIAC selection at fullback, and honored as the Athlete of the Year.

He graduated from Macalester with a BA and MA in Education, and he taught and coached at several high schools before becoming head football coach at the University of North Dakota from 1957-1967. He led the team to three North Central Conference Championships and two post-season bowl victories including the NCAA Midwest Regional Championship in 1966.

Following his coaching career he was associate executive director of the Minnesota State High School League, where he developed the Minnesota State High School Football Playoff system, football overtime rules, and the Prep Bowl.

He was also tournament manager for the Minnesota State High School Hockey Tournament and National Rules Committee Chairman for Ice Hockey and Swimming and Diving for the National Federation of State High School Associations. Coach Helling received numerous awards including induction into the Minnesota Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame, Charter Membership in the Macalester College Athletic Hall of Fame, the University of North Dakota Athletic Hall of Fame, and the Minnesota State High School League Hall of Fame.

Kevin Kessler, Class of 1993, for his leadership in music education

Dr. Kevin Kessler earned his B.M.E. from South Dakota State University where he studied trumpet and conducting. He earned his M.M. from the American Band College or Southern Oregon University, and a D.M.A. in Band Conducting with a minor in Music Education from the University of Iowa.

Kessler is the Director of Athletic Bands and the Lecturer of Music at SDSU, where he directs the Pride of the Dakotas Marching Band, Pep Bands, Concert Band, CommUniversity Band, and the Tube/Euphonium Ensemble. He teaches Instrumental Methods and Materials, Supervision and Administration of School Music and serves as a clinical mentor for student teachers.

Kessler is an active arranger and marching band drill designer.

Prior to his appointment at SDSU, he served as a band director for 14 years in the Brandon Valley, South Dakota School District, where his concert and marching bands consistently earned top rankings and ratings at regional and national contests.

On February 9, 2024, Phi Beta Mu of South Dakota, an international honorary fraternity for band directors, awarded Kessler the 2024 South Dakota Phi Beta Mu Outstanding Bandmaster Award at the South Dakota In-Service Music Conference held in Brookings.

Gary Papik, Class of 1969, for his leadership in business and community building

Gary Papik studied business at Bemidji State University and Minnesota State University and returned to Luverne to run the Oldsmobile business when the owner fell ill.

He later negotiated the sale of that business to


Schoon Motors, where he worked alongside his mentors Warren Schoon and Arnie Tofteland. Papik purchased the dealership in 1990 and five years later built a new operation near I-90.

The company now includes dealerships in Rock Rapids and Sibley in Iowa and employs more than 70 people full- and part-time.

In 2013 Papik was honored with the TIME Dealer of the Year Award among 17,000 dealers nationwide, and he was chosen as a representative with the Minnesota Automobile Dealers Association.

Papik was a founding member of Luverne Initiatives for Tomorrow and is now vice president. He's been a leader in many large communitydriven commercial projects such as: GrandStay Hotel & Suites, Take 16 Brewing Co., Luverne

Trolley LLC, the Arcade Building and the meat market.

He supports hundreds of community functions (such as serving as a mentor for the Southwest CEO program) and fundraising events not only with time and energy but with financial resources.

Vonda Viland, Class of 1984, for her work in education

Vonda Viland led the Morongo Unified School District's (California) alternative program for at-risk students for seven years, working with students who had been disenfranchised from the traditional school system.

About 90 percent of her student body lived below the poverty level, with many struggling with abuse, neglect, parenthood, depression, anxiety and addiction. She and her staff developed an individualized program where they worked to educate the child, not just teach the curriculum.

Viland's book, "Lessons from the Bad Kids,"

and workshops center on the award-winning documentary, 'The Bad Kids," which offers a model for public education to address and combat the crippling effects of poverty in schoolchildren.

As a secondary English teacher for 16 years, Viland received the Commitment to Excellence Award from the California Middle School Foundation and Partnership and was recognized as Teacher of the Year for the California League of Middle Schools Region 10.

After earning her Master's Degree in School Administration from Cal State, she worked as a site administrator at the elementary, secondary and continuation levels. She wrote and led a successful Distinguished School application and three successful Model School applications.

Viland has presented numerous staff development programs, including California Middle School Symposium trainings on portfolio

development and integrated instruction and district trainings on rubric development and utilization.

Luverne Educator Hall of Fame

The Luverne Educator Hall of Fame will induct its first class this September.

The Educator Hall of Fame is intended to "maintain the rich heritage and tradition of successful academic, extracurricular, and operations of Luverne Public Schools," according to the committee.

"The Educator Hall of Fame emphasizes the tremendous impact educators have made on the lives of students throughout the years and also the impact educators have on the community," Luverne Superintendent Craig Oftedahl said this summer when 2024 inductees were announced.

To be selected to the Educator Hall of Fame, the teacher or administrator must have been a full-time educator in the Luverne Public Schools for at least eight years.

They must have "distinguished themselves by demonstrating exceptional leadership, character, and achievement during his/her tenure in the Luverne Public School District."

Nominees must also be retired from or not working in the district for a minimum of five years.

The candidates are also considered for their significant

and/or long-term contributions to Luverne Public Schools and the Rock County community.

"I'm hopeful this type of program will help restore the nobility of the profession to our younger generations and also honor some wonderful people who left their mark on the Luverne Public School system and the entire community," Oftedahl said this summer.

The inaugural class of the Educator Hall of Fame includes five honorees.

Harvey Eitreim, longtime superintendent

Harvey Eitreim was a teacher, principal, and superintendent. He came to Luverne in 1943

to serve as principal of Luverne schools. When the superintendent resigned, Harvey succeeded him and held the post for over 25 years until his retirement in 1978.

During his early years as superintendent, there were 65 different school districts in Rock County, most operating out of one-room school houses. Following school consolidations, the number of ungraded elementary districts had been reduced to 16 by the early 1960s.

Eitreim took the lead in planning for the new Luverne High School building that was completed in 1956. The west wing was then completed in 1965 and the northeast addition in 1973. When vocational education was integrated, Eitreim gave the necessary direction that led to the formation of the Blue Mound Cooperative Center.

He worked closely with the Minnesota State High School League and was elected as the league's president in 1964. He developed a number of personal philosophies about people, education, and administration, including "Education only has one purpose: to make boys and girls better than if they had never gone to school," and "Whatever you do, make hasty decisions slowly."

Esther Spease Frakes, German and English teacher

Esther Spease Frakes was a German and English teacher in Luverne Public Schools for 35 years, from 1964 to 1999.

Luverne was her first and last teaching job. Being in her German classes was not a requirement, but an experience.

Early in her career, "Frau Spease," as she was known to generations of LHS students, was selected as one of 45 teachers to participate in a German immersion program.

She turned the LHS German program into a four-year course of study students can transfer into college credits.

Frau had a sign above her door that said, "Through this door go the best students in the world."

In 1975 she took students on the first of many trips to Germany.

Frau Spease was the coach for the first LHS girls' golf team for one year with a perfect season for the girls.

She was a prom adviser for 25 years, the intramural bowling coach for 20 years, and she led the German Club for all her years of teaching.

Frau Spease was the 1984-85 Luverne Teacher of the Year.

Following her retirement, Spease Frakes was elected to the Luverne City Council in 2004 and served for 12 years before retiring from public service in 2016.

Since Fall 2004 she continues to work as proofreader for the Rock County Star Herald and also continues as a volunteer for Hospice in the Cottage gardens and at St. John Lutheran Church in various capacities.

Gordon Gits, English teacher

Gordon P. Gits was most widely known as the energetic Luverne High School English teacher who was quick to correct his students' grammar and for his Friday vocabulary tests.

Gits taught in the Luverne Public School system for 34 years, from 1955 to 1989. He felt "the reward of being a teacher was to actually see a kid learn."

During his teaching career, he was named "Outstanding Young Educator" by the

Luverne Dollars for Scholars ... Did you know?

Here's how students apply for their Dollars for Scholars scholarships

Scholarship application season is upon us once again! The Luverne High School Class of 2025 is busy working on their scholarship applications. They will be evaluated on the following criteria: academic performance, scholastic aptitude, work experience, school activity and community involvement.

Students are also required to write an essay describing their future aspirations as well as seek a recommendation from someone, whether a teacher or an adult who has worked with the student. These applications are due each year around February 15. All applications are submitted through an online student profile application located on the Luverne Dollars for Scholars website.

Once all of the information is compiled, the selection process begins. Each application is assigned a number. The Luverne High School counselor verifies each students' class rank, GPA and ACT scores.

Only the application number, not the applicant name, is seen throughout the rest of the scoring. Each essay is read and scored by a group of DFS board members. References, work experience, school activity and community involvement are cross checked against the computerized score assigned each applicant.

Not all applicants receive a scholarship. Applications that do not reach the minimum score do not qualify for a scholarship award. None of the scholarships are based on financial need.

Luverne Jaycees in 1967 and in 1968 he received the "Teacher of Excellence" by the Minnesota Teacher of the Year program.

Gits was a volunteer on many projects and played an integral role in launching the Luverne Alumni News.

He served on many civic commissions, boards, and committees.

He was a Luverne city councilman for 12 years, and in 1986 he was elected mayor of Luverne for three terms and served from 1986 to 1992.

Elmer Menage, athletic director, coach, and physical education teacher

Elmer I. Menage arrived in Luverne in 1967. He taught

physical education and driver's education, was head football and track coach, and later became Luverne's athletic director.

In high school Elmer excelled in football, basketball and track. He was then a running back and kicker for the Morningside College Chiefs.

Menage taught and coached generations of students and treasured the relationships he had with each student, parent and colleague.

He received many accolades during his educational career.

These included Morningside College Alumni Coach of the Year in 1984, District 8 Football Coach of the Year in 1974, Region 2 Football Coach of the Year in 1974, and Region 3A Activities Director of the Year in 1992.

He entered the Minnesota Football Coaches Hall of Fame in 2000 and the Minnesota Athletic Director Hall of Fame in 2015.

Menage retired in 1998 after teaching for 31 years in Luverne.

Dolly Talbert, music teacher, choir director

Dolly A. Talbert taught 23 years in Luverne Public Schools where her passion for music became a career.

She maintained contact with students by serving as an accompanist for choirs and vocal and instrumental soloists at

Luverne and Hills-Beaver Creek schools and teaching piano lessons. Another joy for her was reading to elementary classes.

During her teaching years, Talbert was a member of several professional organizations. She was the 1989 Luverne Teacher of the Year and the 1992 Minnesota Choral Director of the Year. Her love for making music found her directing and accompanying not only school choirs, but also church and community vocal and bell choirs for over 50 years.

She directed community Christmas cantatas and also "The Has Beens," a group of male teaching colleagues.

Talbert also wrote several hymns using lyrics written by her church pastors.

Her profound impact on the legacy of music in the Luverne schools and community will live on for generations.
